PRINCIPAL'S REPORT JIM STATHOPOULOS

	 Successful Terry Fox walk, Ms. Steel co-ordinates the walk and she knows the exact amount raised (approximately \$4000).
	• Toronto Island School overnight trip – 2 of the grade 5 classes went in October; and the grade 5's
	from 4/5 classes go in Dec.
	 Huron has a partnership with OISE, Dr. Willows brings over 6 grad students to work with grade one students.
	The fire drills are up to date, the last one went well. A lock down drill is happening soon (2 per
	year).
	 Huron was registered for the cross-country meet, then pulled out, and, as a result, Huron was not allowed to participate in the official meet. Huron participated in the cross-country meet for schools not registered; 20 students ran from Huron.
	Picture day went smoothly
	 Our Eco-team has received gold status from the Board; the Eco-Team is looking at ways to incorporate environmental objectives into the school in more interesting ways (e.g., planting a garden). There are 2 parent reps for the Eco-Team: Marje Stock & another parent.
	New staff: new special needs assistant Kelly Clark; Ms. Liska (ESL) is going on maternity leave soon
	and will be replaced by Joanne Owen.
	Huron received 30 new computers (mobile) in Mr. Goodyear's class, with a locking/recharging cart
DISCUSSION	(HP 3115m Notebook PC).
	Almost all classes are stocked with an ELMO (video camera and projector). Currently, only the
	French and Music class do not have an ELMO.
	Treffert and Masic class do Not Mayor an ELMO.
	School Budget:
	Each year the Board allocates funds to the school. Huron's budget when Jim first started five years
	, , ,
	ago was \$71,000. Our allocation this year is \$59,884 (the school received the funds in August). This is the bottom-line budget, and the key is not to go over.
	Any dollars that are not used are carried over to the next year. The amount we receive from the
	Board is based on estimated enrollment and then adjusted for actual numbers in Oct/Nov.
	Principal Stathopoulos provided a breakdown of the more pertinent line items on the school budget:
	At Huron, each classroom gets \$500 for consumables, and the teachers spend the dollars that are needed in their classroom.
	 For photocopying, each teacher receives a box of 5,000 pages of paper-no cost to copy.
	The kindergarten classes receive \$400/class.
	 LD – Ms. Aveling receives a special education supplement.
	• Library \$4,500.
	D (' ' ' D
	Professional Development – now \$1,700, in the past it was \$9,000. Supply teachers cost \$210 to

cover professional development.

- Literacy and numeracy -- \$3500
- Office supplies -- \$8,000.
- Snow removal we pay extra for this.
- Field trips some families cannot afford to pay and for these families the school covers the cost of the field trip.
- School council \$439 (photocopying, insurance).
- Rent and leasing copiers \$8,000.
- Other line items in the budget include: furniture and repair, telephone, postage, courier, gym, technology.
- Petty Cash and non-public account approximately \$3,000 in this account (Bright Pics gives back \$500 back to the school and it goes into this fund)

EQAO Summary:

- The results for Huron over the last 3 years for grade 3 and grade 6 are at the same level or have improved slightly.
- It is important to note that EQAO is a snapshot and all children are counted in the EQAO test results, even if they don't write the test, their scores are still included.
- The results for grade 3 are as follows: 90% in reading, 92% in writing, and in math Huron dropped to 74%, which is above the board level of 70%. By drilling down the data it is possible to see a disparity between boys and girls in math scores.
- For Huron's grade 6 class, the results are as follows: 81% in reading, 79% in writing and 72% in math.
- Boys and girls in grade 3 have similar results in math but it is in grade 6 where the math results for the girls dip down.
- Huron is trying to do PLCs around math, and the staff work together on the math issue. In summary, the scores are good, teachers are pleased with the results and are working on math.
